To whom it may concern,

My name is Taylour Chang, Director and Film Curator of the Doris Duke Theatre at the Honolulu Museum of Art in Honolulu, Hawaii. Our theatre screens independent, documentary, and international film throughout the year. Each month, we showcase film festivals that celebrate different cultures and genre cinema. I send this letter of recommendation on behalf of Edo Natasha who I have worked with during our African American Film Festival in February 2016.

We screened Edo's film *Popolo* to a sold out audience here at our museum. We support Edo Natasha's work not only because we value our local artists but also because his work represents an underrepresented demographic of storytellers who portray local communities in way that complicates the typical discourses of race and ethnicity. His film *Popolo* –the title of which is Hawaiian slang for African-Americans - confronts a very specific local issue in a way that broader audiences can access. The African American identity in Hawaii faces unique and sensitive challenges in the islands where African Americans make up only 1% of the population and Asians and mixed ethnicities make up over 60% of the population. Although Edo himself is not African American, he was not afraid to make the first narrative feature film to explicitly confront the issues of African American identity in Hawaii. His fearlessness sets him apart from other filmmakers. Far too often, I work with filmmakers of all ethnicities who are afraid to make their viewers and specific communities uncomfortable – it stunts their creativity. To work with a filmmaker like Edo who is not afraid is a pleasure and a breath of fresh air. Such fearlessness is rare and deserves to be supported.

I see the potential for him to continue growing. He deserves all the support in continuing to hone his craft such that he can channel his fearlessness in effective and impactful ways.
